Basketball team plays in Elite Eight

In the final *USA Today/ESPN* Division II Top 25 Coaches Poll and for the first time in school history, the A&M-Commerce women's basketball team is ranked No. 13.

After winning the NCAA Regional, the Lions made their first-ever appearance in the NCAA Elite Eight. In the national quarter-final, the Lions dropped a 60-55 decision to Clayton State.

In the regional tourney, A&M-Commerce defeated No. 8 Washburn, No. 9 Missouri Western State, No. 18 Emporia State, and No. 11 West Texas A&M. A&M-Commerce broke 28 school records on their way to qualifying for the NCAA Tourney.

Serving the community

It began with a lone man walking around a track to raise awareness and funding for the fight against cancer — today Relay For Life is global.

Relay for Life came to A&M-Commerce in 2004 through the work of Luis Franco, who was then a junior biology and Spanish major.

Franco, who now works for the university and plans to begin his graduate studies at A&M-Commerce in the next year, handed the reigns of event chair to math and physics major Sarah Muehlenbein.

Because of the dedication of A&M-Commerce students like Franco and Muehlenbein, teams of enthusiastic A&M-Commerce students and Commerce citizens will gather at Memorial Stadium for an overnight relay against cancer from 7 p.m. on Friday, April 13, until 7 a.m. on Saturday,

April 14.

"Relay For Life raises awareness about the progress against cancer as well as being a fund raiser," says Muehlenbein. "Many of the participants will be people who have dealt with cancer themselves. Their involvement is proof of the progress that has been made in reducing cancer death rates and in the quality of life following cancer treatment."

Both Franco and Muehlenbein have lost family to the disease.

"It's a worthy cause," says Franco. "It really attracts and encourages students to participate as they can not only serve the community, but relate their work for Relay For Life to their area of study."

The H.M. Lafferty, Paul W. Barrus, and Neill Humfeld Awards will be presented.

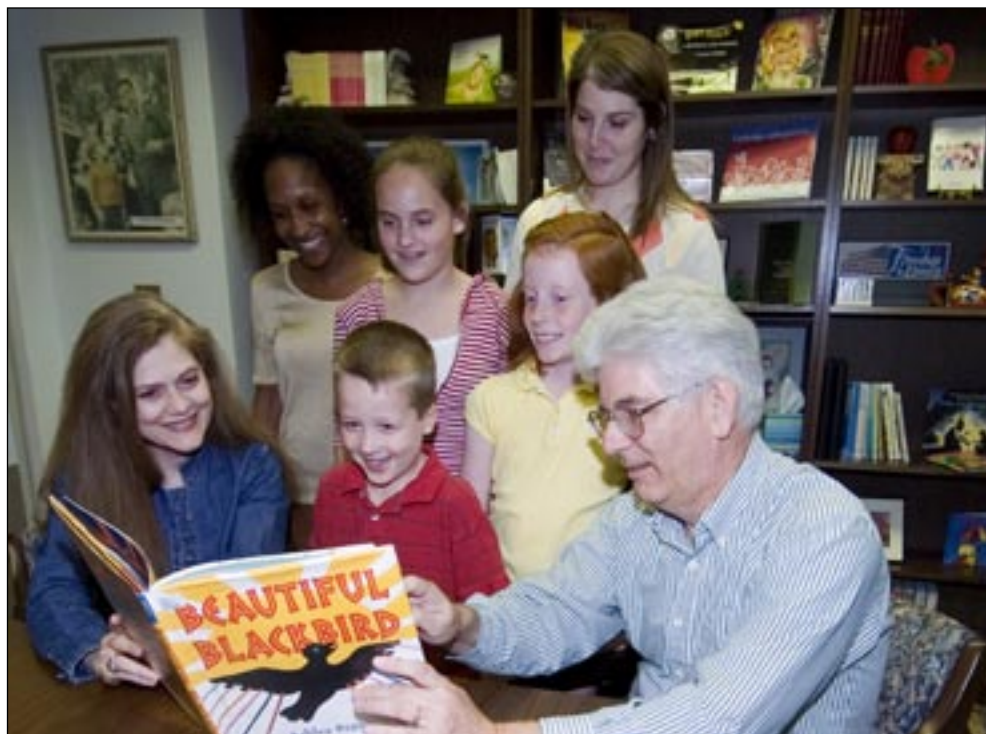
Attend Cotton Symposium
